Community Outreach & Mission



Our Jar Offering for the first four Sundays in September will go to The Lot Project which provides a meal to those in need on Tuesday and Thursday from 4:30-6:00 p.m. They also provide shoes, coats, and blankets to those in need, on the first Friday of every month.

The fifth Sunday Jar Offering will go to Blue Dragonfly Dragonfly whose mission is to help juvenile victims of human trafficking via advocacy, education, outreach, awareness and resources.

Our 2-Cents-a-Meal Offering for the 3rd Quarter will go to Buchanan Fishes & Loaves, based at 1206 S. Murray Avenue in Anderson South Carolina. The center can provide non-perishable food as well as groceries to the less fortunate in the community, and hundreds of local families get help from it on a monthly basis. Any bags of groceries and other items are passed out first come, first served basis, and the Buchanan pantry is only open Monday through Friday, 9 am to 11:30 am.

Good Neighbor Cupboard

Good Neighbor Cupboard provides lunch bags for our local brothers and sisters in need of help with their daily nutrition. For September and October, please consider adding one or more of the following items to your weekly grocery list so we can support their efforts. The most needed items are tuna pouches (not cans), protein bars, granola bars, canned foods with pop tops, peanut butter/cheese cracker packs...items that can be opened without a can opener. I recently read this description of why helping provide food can help people avoid homelessness, and it struck a chord with me:

Sometimes people face a demon's dilemma. When they have to make a choice between buying food or paying rent, they're going to buy food. If we can help provide them food, they can pay their rent & not end up homeless. If they can stay in their homes, perhaps they can keep their jobs & not end up needing shelter OR food (from The Road Home by Richard Paul Evans).

Getting to Know Your Church Neighbor...Who's Cookie Brown?

This month's interview was with Rosalynn Loskoski Rozakos...quite a mouthful, so we'll just call her Roz. Like prior interviews, hers was enlightening and very entertaining. (The more entertaining parts were "off the record" so in true journalistic fashion, I can't reveal all that was said J). But what do we already know about Roz? Most of us know that she was raised in Midway Church; that she has a beautiful soprano voice; and that she's been the Choir Director of Midway's Mass Walking Wounded Chancel Choir (her words, not mine) for a dozen years this month. But what did we learn from our interview?

Roz was born into a musical family on her mother's side, the Vandivers. She was a Debutone through Junior High and HS; this was an elite group of young female singers from Georgia and South Carolina who often performed at national events. In 1964 & '65, the Debutones sang Broadway tunes and gospel songs at the New York World's Fair! They also performed in our nation's capital and at our nation's Capitol at a Cherry Blossom Festival. But they were best known and beloved by the members of Midway Church when their quartet performed as the Disciples of Joy (later known as the Joint Heirs) at Sunday services. The quartet consisted of Roz, Kim Wentzky, Alan Nowell and LaVonne Hopkins, with piano accompaniment by Sandra Kay. Those were the days when Midway was full of young folks, including our still-current, just not as young, members Sammy Stevenson, Keith, and Cindy Wentzky, and the sanctuary and Fellowship Hall were only attached by a breezeway. Roz said that's where the youth group would meet with their teacher, Blanche Campbell, on Sunday evenings. Her brother Greg was touched by the Spirit during those years, and is now a retired Presbyterian pastor.

A vivid memory from those good old days was the trip that Roz took to "Jesus '76" with Kim Kowalski and the entire Rosenberger family: Beryl, Mary and their 6 children – all in Beryl's station wagon, pulling a small trailer loaded with tents. They spent three days at a campground in Orlando, listening to religious speakers and singers, including B.J. Thomas and Andrae Crouch. Roz still envisions Andrae singing while the lights from the fireworks at Disney World lit up the evening sky behind him. She also remembers having to go three days without a shower, so she finally made Peter Rosenberger pour water over her head so she could at least wash her hair.

Impressively, Roz worked for Belk's for 40 years...moving through the ranks from gift wrapper as a junior in HS to Office Manager about 15 years later. But during this time, she was spiritually inspired to offer her services as a House Mother at Thornwell Home in Clinton, taking a two-year leave from Belk's. For her first year at Thornwell she was House Mother to eight girls, aged 8 to 11; and the 2nd year to eight girls, aged 11 to 15. She claims the first group was easier to handle, but even forty years later, she is still in contact with many of the young women whose lives she blessed while she was at Thornwell. The only highlight she noted from her years at Belk's was meeting Burt Lancaster when he was in Anderson filming "The Midnight Man". But Burt never stayed in touch like her Thornwell girls do, so no contest there.

Roz met the love of her life, Pete Rozakos, in the late 60's when he saw her out one night and asked her to dance. She said he was the "handsomest boy I'd ever seen in my life", and they dated for about a year, until Pete moved to Atlanta for work for the next 30+ years. But when he returned to Anderson, he soon called to ask her out for coffee, and the rest is history. Pete, as many of you know, is part of a very large Greek family, so Roz insisted that he become a Presbyterian and join her at Midway, since the Greeks celebrate every event with gifts and dinners, and they could better afford to be Presbyterians than Greeks J. Pete embraced Midway and became a deacon when we still had enough members to fill a diaconate.

Roz's words of encouragement for our dear little church is to remember that church is not something you go to; it's a family you belong to. As long as we all keep this in mind and do our best to welcome new members to the family, Midway will survive today's lack of youth and some folks' overall apathy toward church-going. Roz is working to set up a musical event with the Saint Mark Singers from Seneca, who have performed at Midway before. Our hope is that events like this, which are open to the public, might introduce us to some of our new neighbors and pique their interest in attending our worship services. Watch for a date to be announced for this hopefully upcoming event. Roz stressed how grateful she is for our small but dedicated choir, which is a true blessing to her, and she did explain why she's known to some folks as Cookie Brown, but that's not for publication. If you want to know, ask Marilyn Martin. J
