Friends in Christ,

Happy Fall! Football games are in full swing, the World Series will soon begin, and it is apple and pumpkin everything season. October brings several special dates in the life of the church. The first Sunday in October is World Communion Sunday, the last is Reformation Sunday.

"As Christians, our faith began with the followers of Jesus. But the beginning of our Christian faith as *Presbyterian* is in the Reformation. The Reformation marks something significant for us in this part of the universal church: the coalescence of our focus on the Holy Spirit's ongoing reform of us as a church and as individuals." Reformation Sunday is the day we acknowledge the day (October 31st) when Martin Luther posted 95 theses on the door of the church in Wittenberg, Germany. This event marks the beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

The Reformation continued over time, spreading to Switzerland, Great Brittan and eventually to the US and other parts of the world. That same work of discerning the movement of God's Spirit in the church continues. Such discernment is seen in the practice of the Lord's Supper. The sacrament originates with the words of Jesus to his disciples, but he did not leave specific instructions for its practice. In the first century, the Apostle Paul admonished the church in Corinth for their practice of Lord's Supper without concern for others. The practice of giving out communion tokens was brought to colonial America where a pastor and elders went to congregation members to determine their worthiness to take the sacrament. Until the early 1980's, children in the Presbyterian Church (USA) were not served communion until after they were confirmed. After much study, this practice was changed. The Book of Order states: The opportunity to eat and drink with Christ is not a right bestowed upon the worthy, but a privilege given to the undeserving who come in faith, repentance, and love.

In the Lord's Supper, we give thanks to God, it is a sign of God's covenant and steadfast love; we remember Jesus, not only his death but his life and the promise of his return, the sacrament is a call to care for one another as Jesus did and it is a foretaste of the time when all will be gathered around Christ's table. In this meal past, present, and future are held together.

Baptism and communion, the two sacraments we celebrate, are vital to our identity as the people of God and community of Christ. These sacraments are often called visible signs of an invisible grace. In these sacraments, we also worship with all our senses – we hear the water in which we are claimed as God's children; feel the water that unites us with Christ and one another; smell the bread and juice anticipating the meal that nourishes us for our life of faith. Font and table are central in our worship space, visible and welcoming reminders of these gifts of grace.

World Communion Sunday began in 1930 to bring churches together in the unity of Jesus Christ and as a reminder of our interconnectedness. The idea originated in the Presbyterian Church (US) and was extended to other denominations. In 1940 the invitation was extended worldwide, and the celebration of the day became widespread. This year, the communion table will be covered with fabrics representing other countries and cultures as a reminder that we are sharing the Lord's Supper, on the same day, as our Christian brothers and sisters around the world.
